On motion by Trustee Alexandris-Miller, seconded by Trustee Field, the Board unanimously (5/0) entered into executive session at 6:18 pm. On a motion by Trustee Alexandris-Miller, seconded by President Nedbor-Gross the Board unanimously (7/0) adjourned executive session at 7:27 pm.

Executive Session

The meeting was called to order by the Board President, Pledge of Allegiance, and a moment of silence for our troops. Roll call was taken, as noted above at 7:35 pm.

Committee Reports

Audit Committee – Victoria Galante mentioned that at the last board meeting the committee met with the internal auditors and we went over the risk assessment which the board will be approving tonight and within 90 days Ms. Galante will come up with a corrective action plan for the board to approve. The internal auditors will be back in the fall to do two or three agreed upon areas.

Policy Committee – Trustee Alexandris-Miller stated that they met last week. We had asked NYSSBA to help us restructure our policy manual to make it more in line with what other districts do and we're starting to receive different sections of the manual and will be reviewing those sections and discussing it at our next meeting. There is also a policy for discussion tonight.

Facilities Update – no update.

City Liaison - Trustee Huggins stated that the city of Glen Cove is still there and is still no help to us. We will continue to push them to give us a hand on certain things like a place to put busses.

Superintendent's Report - Updates:

Dr. Rianna stated that last night she had the honor of participating at international night at the high school. There were about 250 people who attended. It was held in the gymnasium with little table's setup for projects from all different countries. A cooperative effort was provided by not only the world languages teacher but with the special education, ENL departments as well as our BOCES twilight program. It was a wonderful evening with all nationalities.

Last week Dr. Rianna went to Albany and while up there received a supportive phone call from an assemblyman from our area and it's not the first time. Dr. Rianna called up Mrs. Roni Lavine who was in attendance for her husband Chuck. Dr. Rianna mentioned that her discussion referenced a situation that happened at the high school when students rehearsing in the high school auditorium for a play that was scheduled for last weekend. As the group finished a particular act they moved away from a piece of scenery when a string of lights came down due to a faulty bracket. Luckily there were no injuries and the presentation was canceled. Two companies came in and we found out that there hasn't

been an update in materials and portions of this stage as well as the middle school Wunch center in over twenty years. Part of our presentation of the budget spoke about getting that work done over the summer at the cost of almost \$300,000 and when I gave that number to Assemblyman Lavine he stated he would call me back. He came to see the structures at both locations and called me to say that we're going to have to act fast and was gracious enough to find \$250,000 for the repairs. This is not the first time he has come through with monies to help support us. When we spoke about the particulars of the bond that was voted upon on March 12th he added \$450,000 towards that as well. In recognition of his continued and unwavering support to the Glen Cove school district we're presenting him with this certificate.

Mrs. Roni Lavine thanked Dr. Rianna, President Nedbor-Gross as well as all the trustees many of whom she knows well for allowing her to speak on behalf of her husband Assemblyman Chuck Lavine. Chuck and I are very proud of this school system which our children Gregory and Andrea attended and where they along with their friends received a first rate education. My kids are doing so well and we're so proud of them and the foundation was laid right here. I was privileged to teach at Gribbin, Landing and for most of my career alongside Rose Sekelsky at Connolly school. I was so proud of my students for the many years that I was there and I'm proud of our district and all they do for our children. We have an almost four year old grandson who lives in Glen Cove and will be attending Glen Cove schools. Chuck and I believe that there is no better community to live in and raise a family. Chuck had another meeting that he had to chair tonight so this is from Chuck:

"Each of us is fortunate enough to serve in public office has it first and foremost the solemn responsibility of protecting the lives and the safety of our children. That is precious what community is all about. I know that Dr. Rianna and our outstanding administrators and teachers feel that same way as do the board of trustees. With that in mind we are all whether we live inside or outside of Glen Cove thanking our lucky stars that none of our students, teachers, administrators or staff was injured when this lighting structure fell. This must serve as a call to arms, to each of us. Our school buildings desperately need repair. To argue otherwise is to argue against what is obvious and worst to argue otherwise endangers our community. I'm very pleased to be able to drive a major New York state grant of a quarter of a million dollars to our schools to replace the lighting structures at both the high school auditorium and the middle school Wunch auditorium but this grant significant as it may be is just a stop gap measure because there is so much more that must be done. It is past time for our community to meet this challenge by supporting these repairs and I have every confidence that the people of Glen Cove will rise to the occasion. Dr. Rianna, president Nedbor-Gross and board of trustees and members of our community here this evening to support public education. I want each of you to know that you have my sincere admiration and gratitude and now let's really get to work on our buildings. Thank you"

Mrs. Lavine stated that we love our community, we love our schools, we love our children and before he and I get too old let's get this work done. There are time when I say what can we do, what's going to happen and his words are always we just keep fighting for what's right. Whether it's education, human rights, whatever. He's in there fighting.

Dr. Rianna mentioned that she was in Albany in the beginning of March and then again a couple of weeks later along with some parents from the community. Chuck knew I was coming to Albany and he was very instrumental in making sure that we had a meeting with the president of the education committee in the assembly. His work, his support, his ability to allow us to meet with these people where we may have not had that meeting really helped bring that additional money in state aid (1.5 million). He's probably tired of seeing me and he's always been extremely supportive and I thank him as we move forward to advocate for our foundation aid and for other areas where state aid can be sent to us appropriately.

2019-2020 Budget Presentation – Victoria Galante presented the proposed school budget. Copies of the presentation we made available to everyone in attendance. She answered any questions that were brought up by the board of education.

Trustee Alexandris-Miller wanted the opportunity to thank Dr. Rianna for all the hard work she has done in getting the extra five million that would not have happened without her hard work. The several years of Dr. Rianna going up to Albany and talking to the legislatures as well as her involvement in the Suburban Harmed Five and the small city schools group.

Dr. Rianna stated that it's a concerted effort that's put together by the small city schools association as well as the schools superintendents. The Harmed Suburban Five will continue to move forward. Although we've been successful in including the tier in the foundation aid formula, the fight is not over yet. We're still not fully funded. I will be meeting with the superintendent for Ossining and we will then be speaking with our boards of education and community as we plan next years' strategy.

Trustee Juarez thanked Victoria for always having patience with us. I want to make sure that ninth period goes into effect and that we can sustain it and keep moving forward. I've commented Victoria Galante in the past for being straight and blunt and I appreciate. Are there other contracts out there for our transportation that you anticipate ahead of time that may affect our budget in the coming years'. How do we forecast for something like that. The other area is the assurance of continuance that we have to carry for three years how are we certain that we're in our requirements. Thanks for looking at other solutions to saving us money.

Victoria Galante responded to Trustee Juarez by stated that a few years ago when the ninth period day was brought up I recommended to not include it yet, however you will be able to sustain it now but you have to be very careful in how you spend your money in the budget and just because we put it in now doesn't mean that things are always going to be great. The contribution rates in health insurance, ERS, TRS went down and no one know what's coming in the future. You have solid reserves and whenever you can put money into them to help you along. In the 1920 budget you're only using two reserves out of four. We've always used four reserves because we had to. I told Dr. Rianna that the nine period day could not be sustain on the backs of the reserves because you would deplete them in time so going forward we have two reserves that we should be using because we're self-funded in workman's comp and should be used and the tax cert reserve and continue to fund with the money left over when we closed our books. You need to monitor your budget at the end of the year. The salaries for the assurance of continuance are in the budget for the next few years. Regarding the transportation contract we need to look at that again. I've been in talks with another district who's going through something similar to what we went through last year, and if we can do something together. We'll talk with them after our budgets pass so that we know what we're dealing with and if we can do something with out of district vans. In the Governor's budget he put a clause for districts to piggy back on other districts contracts for outside providers, which is something we couldn't do before. I'll be in communication with our attorney's so that they can let me know what we can and can't do. I'm not happy with our transportation especially because the first six bills from them have been incorrect.

Public Participation

The following topics were presented during the public participation section on agenda items only.

- What is it that we're asking of the city when you say that the city isn't being cooperative? As I don't have confidence with the way the community is voting these days on things what are we doing to really try to explain to them and educate them? Are we allowed to have a blurb of something at the polls so they know what it means because they may think it's costing them money. What happens if they vote no? I know how hard you've been lobbying for the Harmed Suburban Five, has the board started a plan for each of you or together to lobby and get involved in getting us our fair share? Other board members from other districts had a lot of their board members up in Albany. Can we start to get a pack or a political action committee of parents, district and community people to continue to lobby? What's the board plan moving forward?

Dr. Rianna stated that her and Victoria go out and try to explain all aspects of the budget or other referendum items that are involved in the May vote. We're more than happy to go to other areas of Glen Cove or organization so that there's an education. A budget

letter is sent to every home in Glen Cove and we hope that it's read. There will also be copies in each of the buildings. Additionally, we send out a budget postcard with the levy limits and other information. If it's not approved you can't establish it and we would have to determine if we revoke that one item which may not be advantageous or doing the following year with the new board. The Suburban Harmed Five and the advocacy, once we get a plan of action in place and what the calendar will be for the upcoming year I will distribute to the board and they can make arrangements on dates that may be lobby days and what we want to say in an appropriate manner. I usually meet in a meeting room with many others to speak with our legislatures as well as speaking with them separately because giving them the information in short meetings helps them process the information.

Trustee Huggins mentioned that during the last ten years I've been attempting to find a place to park busses in the city of Glen Cove which would save us seven million dollars. This would change the bid process as other bus companies do not want to bring their buses without a place to park their busses. I have several city council members helping look.

- There were specific dates throughout the school year when small city board members and community members were told these are the dates to come up to lobby and you make appointments with our specific representative in the assembly and the senate as well as go to speak with a number of people. The board has to reach out and make those appointments. In terms of what board members and the board as a whole can and cannot do regarding getting the community to vote for a budget or a bond or a proposition. A corporate entity cannot spend district money but you can in the instance of a budget get the word out to people specifically as to what would be dropped if the budget was voted down and the district went to austerity. That you're allowed to do as you're not telling them to vote yes or no. You're telling them what disasters would be brought upon this district in a one page document simply worded. These are the things we would not have for the children, teachers and administrators of the district. As a whole you're allowed to do that. You can say as individuals vote yes.
- I think this capital reserve sound like a good idea. How much money are we talking about to put aside for the capital reserve every year and where does it come from? Would it still be able to be kept in the 2% limit?

Victoria Galante responded by saying that the maximum amount of money allowed to be placed in the reserve would be up to five million and the money would come from funds left over when we close our books. On an average you have two – three percent of your budget left at the end of each year. In the past that money was always split it up and placed it into different reserves. Moving forward if our reserves are healthy you can put that money into the capital reserve each year. There may be years that you don't have that much left over depending on the budget. The tax cap formula has nothing to do with this.

- On a capital reserve it doesn't become a line item that we have to put money into? So it's just saved in this and can be used based on voter approval? This information is important to get out there that the capital reserve will not incur additional monies to fund it. Giving the climate of what happened with the bond and if people get the feeling that they're going to have to put money into something else they may get the wrong impression and vote it down.

Victoria Galante responded by stating that any reserve is funded by monies that are left over when you close your books. You can keep 4% of those funds on the side not in a reserve. This year we used some of that money for the fire alarm project. Other reserves are restricted reserves so any money after the 4% that you put aside you're allowed to put into any one of the multiple reserves. Once those monies are put into those reserves they can only be used for what that reserve was setup to be used for. Reserves do not cost any tax payer any more money. It's like a savings account.

Trustee Juarez asked if we're to use funds from the capital account would you have to get voter approval.

Victoria Galante stated no you only vote on it in May. If there's an emergency project during the school year we're going to have to use our 4%.


- In terms of information that I asked for at the last meeting, I had called Dr. Rianna's office and left a message with another secretary as Dr. Rianna's secretary was out and my assumption was that the message got to her, however, it did not. The only reason I asked the question was because I attended the Monday bond meeting where going into it, it seemed that the board had the meeting to get input from the public and those from the public that were here were waiting to hear what the board was thinking in terms of what would be put into a different bond to be voted on. I thought it would've been interesting to know what it would cost to do certain projects. I didn't ask because I didn't think anyone else was interested. I didn't think that projects I asked about we're those that I necessarily felt were absolutely necessary to go into the bond. I studied what was put up for that was defeated. That bond was worked on with everything that needed to be done. I just picked thing out that would start a discussion. But because my questions didn't get through to Dr. Rianna she didn't have the information. Anything that you put out in the budget has to be short and to the point. That newsletter isn't going to be read any more than information on the bond was read. If you put out one page filled from top to bottom no one's going to read it. Three

points in big bold print between now and budget vote and you'll get attention.

On a motion by Trustee Huggins, seconded by Trustee Field, the Board unanimously (7-0) moved to adjourn the public meeting at 9:00pm. Next meeting scheduled for Wednesday, May 8, 2019, High School at 7:00 pm.
