Superintendent's Report - Updates:

Celebration of Student Success – Dr. Rianna stated that looking back at this school year we have to be proud at all the different opportunities that our students have participated in and as a result the outstanding results. We truly have an amazing student body, wonderful teachers who support and guide our students to victory, success or achievement on a daily basis. Dr. Rianna turned this section of the meeting over to Dr. Israel who acknowledged 128 students in various categories. They included art scholarship association winners; art show winners; all state symphonic band; spelling bee winners; all county band, chorus and orchestra students; TV crew; the north American computational linguistics award winners; Northwell medical marvel team; NYSSBA all county chorus and band ensemble alternates; photography awards; SPARK team and student leadership voter drive. Each student was presented with a certificate and pictures were also taken.

High school principal, Antonio Santana, stated that tonight is somewhat obvious why we feel proud of our school and community. At the high school PRIDE has many meanings and for him he wants his students to feel a sense of community and family. He stated he wants them to be proud and represent Glen Cove in a spectacular manner. PRIDE stands for (P-prepared, R-respectful, I-involved, D-diligent, E-ethical). A few weeks ago Mr. Santana approached Dr. Rianna with a crazy idea of filming a video. What it involved was having all our students in the hallways showing off what their proud of and filming it

in one take and no cuts. It was done the day before spring break with a spectacular result. Mr. Santana thanked the GCTV crew, our teachers who are members of our PBIS committee and Dr. Rianna who allowed him to shut the school down an hour early to make this happen. The video was shown to the audience ending to a loud applause.

Dr. Rianna stated that six years ago when she came into the district there were financial difficulties. Last week the district received a call that their rating had changed. Moody's is the reason we can go out and get the best interest rates, the best deals as we move forward and support our district in many different ways. She presented a certificate of recognition to Victoria Galante, assistant superintendent of business, for dramatically and consistently improving the district's financial position.

Ms. Galante stated that she loves her job and does it for all the programs for the children in the district. The students are amazing and they're the inspiration to do what I do, and so as a district we can give them more as that's what they deserve.

Community Bond Forum Follow-Up – May 22, 2019

Trustee Juarez – it seems that they fixed the glass on the vestibule at Connolly school. Also if Ms. Galante can update us on Trustee Huggins give us an update on the Gribbin school.

Ms. Galante stated that the damaged piece of class on the vestibule at Connolly school has been fixed since our last meeting. Victoria mentioned that at Gribbin school they had to bring the exterior door out which consisted of a new slab and the ceiling had to be readjusted because of the size of the door. They had run into some issues but had to address some issues to secure the building. Our custodial staff assisted the installers to get that done. They will continue to address that building and it's the last building to have its vestibule installed and hopefully it will be taken care of within the next few weeks. We haven't paid the installer for any of the vestibules yet and we don't usually pay anyone until final inspection by the director of facilities, architects and engineers or anyone else involved. Anyone that does anything in the district doesn't get paid until they finish their punch list.

Trustee Huggins – mentioned that looking at the vestibule at Gribbin today, it's about 95% complete. It seems that where the custodian's door is they had moved the room out a few feet and not realizing that there was about 1 ½" of bricking that stuck out on each side and when they tried to put the door frame in they had to jack hammer it to have it fit properly. We're also back charging the vendor.

New Business

Trustee Juarez stated that when our bond rating was presented that we were an AA3. I had worked for Merrill Lynch at one time and we were involved with things like that and if there was bond insurance available. When companies look at bond insurance we normally have to pay for that because it gets factored into the cost. We were also told that we were in a good place to possibly request a new rating. Was there a cost involved to get that rating change because at the meeting they said it would be pricey if we did? We still have a small bond on the books? Can we negotiate a better interest rate on the existing bonds still on the books? Thanked Victoria for working on that and it looks good.

Ms. Galante answered Trustee Juarez that the district is now an AA2 and we have two more steps to go. There double A 1 and Triple A being the highest you can go. If Moody's didn't reach out to us when they did and whenever a bond does pass and you'd have to borrow we were going to reach out to Moody's to see if they could do anything as far as our rating. They ended up reaching out to me about a week after the bond failed. My first conversation with them was that they know the bond failed and what was my plan. I thought at that point that our chances of our rating being increased was not that good and I thought that they were going to give us a positive outlook but when they came back to us last week they had raised the rating which was a surprise. Ms. Galante also stated that nothing was paid for a rating change. Victoria reached out to the city and the financial advisor for information needed to turn over to Moody's and it was a phone interview with the Moody's committee. A lot of the questions they had already had the answers to because it was provided ahead of time. The interview was based on some items of clarification and what was really addressed was information about me which included my background and what is going to be done in the future. They sent us their press release for review and to make sure everything was correct. Besides a press release on their website they also have an article. We still have a bond on the books that will be coming off in 2023 and the other in 2026 and these have both been refinanced before I got here and not sure if it can be done again.

Dr. Rianna stated that we can add that each year we have given our financial advisors our

audit reports, end of year financial reports and that has really been the spotlight that allowed Moody's to say you've been consistent for a number of years, your moving in the right direction, your more stable financially and they've reached out to us.

Public Participation

The following topics were presented during the public participation section on non-agenda or any items.

- At the last few meetings I have members of the board and people ask why did the bond proposal fail? Nobody asked me but that's ok. I've been in this community more than most people and I might have some ideas why it did. Does anyone here know how many counties there are in the state of New York or in the United States? There are 62 counties in the state of New York and 3,142 counties in the United States and we have had the distinction for many years for being the highest property taxed county of any of them. Unfortunately, we just lost out this year to Westchester who is now number one. We're still number two and in time we can re-achieve the status of being number one. There are a lot of people in Glen Cove. Some are rich – they don't want to pay anymore property taxes especial now that they can't deduct anything over \$10K. There are a lot of poor people in Glen Cove – they can't afford to pay anymore and then the shrinking middle class and they don't know why they should pay anymore. Even though the bond proposal was for many useful and noble purposes, it's all about the money and there may be others ways to arrive at the projects that need to be done and I think the bond has proven to be not the best way. I'm willing to put my two cents in and suggest things that I think might be useful and work. I'm across the street. It's pretty close. I'm there twelve-seven if anyone wants to contact me to get some of those suggestions that I might have that might work better than what's not worked in the past. I'd be willing to entertain that, a phone call is all that's necessary and you can get me any time you'd like.
- In the last several weeks I've heard from more people because what's they've had to say to me were based on lies, lies and more lies about the financial state of this school district, about what happens with their tax payer money which they assured me is being stolen and no matter what I said, no matter what facts I gave them they didn't want to hear it. So when the lies over the years have been put out there. Knowingly put out there and people have come to believe these things they are not apt to vote for a bond know matter how needed all those things in the bond were. They have no trust based on the lies they've been told. They don't care if they have children in the district. Children in a classroom, in the library, in the music room where the ceilings could fall on their children's heads. They don't care if floors are uneven, they don't care if there's flooding if there's massive rain, they don't care. They voted no if they voted, some didn't get to vote because they were caught in that business of their names not being in the book when they showed up. My concern is that they're going to show up for the school budget and vote no because if you believe the lies, that the money is being stolen. It is not! If they don't believe anything else they should at least believe what Moody's has just done for this district based on fact. They just don't improve your rating. There's a concern, and I don't know what to tell you about getting people out to vote for the budget. I have told you that legally you can do that as long as you spend no school district money, can't use the district website, but you can do that and I suggest you better do that. I don't know how. I don't know if you did it on social media pages as I don't go onto those sights but you need to do something otherwise you're going to have budget go down to defeat.

Victoria Galante stated that we have auditors in the district all the time. You have a claims auditor that reviews every check that goes out of this district every month. She looks at every warrant. You have internal auditors that come in the fall and late winter spring time. You have external auditors that are here in June and again in August. They look at all the funds not only our general fund, but our special aid, capital, food service funds. They ask questions and if the answers that we give them are wishy-washy they want proof. I don't know how any district in this day and time can do anything without getting caught. We have the state controller that sends people to the districts and at a meeting I was at a couple weeks ago said to me we're going around again and we'll be seeing you soon. They can come in at any time and request an entrance meeting with a list of things that they need to see. As a tax payer in another district and without knowing

how they run their district. I'm confident that enough people like auditors going in and out of that district all the time to watch. In the past that wasn't so, before the Roslyn crisis, it was a little more like the wild-wild west but that doesn't exist anymore. People should have confidence that their money is being watched by multiple people including central office. I would never do anything that would ruin my reputation or even worse put me in jail. Everything is transparent, everything is up and up. I get the fact that the community doesn't trust but they have to get over it. You don't punish the current administration that is doing the right thing for the people in the past that may or may not have done the right thing. I don't know as I was not here or Dr. Rianna was not here. Don't take it out on the people that are really very hard to do the right thing. If anyone has questions or concerned about anything they know where to find us. They can come in. I can't tell you how to vote, I can tell you what's in the budget and how it's going to impact you.

Dr. Rianna mentioned that their invitation is sincere and we've had people come in and get educated and shown the proof. All our audit reports are available for review as well. It's making sure that those people whom may have had a negative experience in the past either here or elsewhere and are now here to be able to give the information that is accurate and transparent. I would hope that they would come to the source. I know rumors are out there and sometimes when that game of telephone gets played the information is always as accurate as it should be. If you have neighbors, friends, community members that feel there are still questions there is no stupid question, there is no question we won't answer for you. We invite you to come and get the information. We want you to feel comfortable with the manner in which we handle our finances. We go out to different organizations. The understanding of the reserves, creating a capital reserve. We gotten feedback and it's very positive and I think it's because of the years we've put out information and consistently lived by that information. Speak to your neighbors and if there's any questions ask them to come to a board meeting. If they're not comfortable doing that have them call or come to district office. *Dr. Rianna* stated that they do presentations to each of the PTA's.

President Nedbor-Gross mentioned that we also reach out to the PTA's and PTA Council. There will be mailings going out explaining what the budget is all about. Hopefully this budget will be accepted by the public and if they have any questions there free to call our central office for any information.

Trustee Juarez mentioned that when you're discussing oversight and you see these outside agencies come in board members ask questions as well so don't hate a board member because there asking a million questions. This is part of our job. We have to look at the budget, ask questions and we have to make sure it's being spent the way we would expect it. We do work with the superintendent. I've complemented Victoria in the past for doing things and moving them forward. At the very least I'm looking at the numbers and I'll question them. I want to make sure that we're doing more with less. There's no guarantee that we're going to get the same budget number next year from the state. In the past they've threatened to be able to pull funding mid-year, so that's another thing we need to worry about.

On a motion by Trustee Huggins, seconded by Trustee Juarez, the Board unanimously (6-0) moved to adjourn the public meeting at 9:02pm. Next meeting scheduled for Wednesday, May 22, 2019, High School at 7:30 pm.
